2024 VOTE RECORD: STATE ISSUES

MIOSHA REPORTING REQUIREMENTS



House Bill 4011 would create an automatic reduction in fines and penalties for failure to report injuries or fatalities on “family farms.” Farm Bureau supports the legislation that passed the

House (93-13) on Feb. 29 and awaits consideration by the Senate Government Operations Committee.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 25 points

ENERGY SITING



House Bills 5120 and 5121 restricted local control of large-scale commercial wind, solar and battery storage projects and provided permitting authority to the Michigan Public Service

Commission. Farm Bureau opposed the legislation that was signed into law on Nov. 28, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 15 points each

ENVIRONMENTAL OVERSIGHT



Senate Bills 393 and 394 would eliminate the Environmental Science Advisory Board and the Environmental Permit Review Commission. Farm Bureau opposes the legislation that

passed that Senate (20-18) on Nov. 2, 2023. Both bills await a vote in the full House.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 5 points each

ENVIRONMENTAL OVERSIGHT



House Bill 4826 eliminated the Environmental Rules Review Committee. Farm Bureau opposed the legislation that was signed into law on Feb. 27, 2024.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 10 points

4-H FOUNDATION FUNDRAISING PLATE



House Bills 5056 and 5058 would authorize the secretary of state to develop and issue a fundraising license plate recognizing the Michigan 4-H. Funds generated by plate purchases would be directed to the Michigan 4-H Foundation. Farm Bureau supports the legislation that passed the House (105-4) on Nov. 8 and awaits consideration by the Senate Transportation and Infrastructure Committee.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 10 points each

COMMODITY GROUP AUDIT REQUIREMENTS



Senate Bill 691 would reduce the auditing requirement for agricultural commodity groups to one audit per referenda (when producers vote to continue the program) if the collected producer

assessments are less than \$40,000. Farm Bureau supports the bill that passed the Senate unanimously on March 12 and awaits consideration by the House Agriculture Committee.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 10 points

RENEWABLE ENERGY STANDARDS



Senate Bills 271 and 273 require electric providers to achieve a renewable energy credit portfolio of at least 60% by 2035, and an electric provider to achieve a clean energy portfolio of 100% by

2040 and beyond. Farm Bureau opposed the legislation that was signed into law on Nov. 28, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 5 points each

STATE AND FEDERAL RULEMAKING



Senate Bill 14 removed the statutory requirement that state rules not be more stringent than those established by the federal government. Farm Bureau opposed the legislation that was

signed into law on Aug. 22, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

AGRICULTURE AND FDA APPROPRIATIONS



H.R. 4366 included Fiscal Year 2024 appropriations for the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Food & Drug Administration. Farm Bureau supported the legislation that passed the U.S. Senate on

Nov. 1, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 25 points

CONTINUING RESOLUTION WITH FARM BILL EXTENSION



H.R. 6363 was a continuing resolution that included a one-year extension of the 2018 Farm Bill. Farm Bureau supported the legislation that passed the U.S. House on Nov. 14, 2023, and the

U.S. Senate on Nov. 15, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 25 points

TAX RELIEF FOR AMERICAN FAMILIES AND WORKERS



H.R. 7024 would extend 100% bonus depreciation, increase section 179 deduction, provide disaster tax relief, increase child tax credit, and other beneficial tax policy. Farm Bureau supported the legislation that passed the U.S. House on Jan. 31, 2024.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 20 points

ADVERSE EFFECT WAGE RATE FREEZE HOUSE COSPONSOR REQUEST



Farm Bureau requested members of Michigan's U.S. House delegation to sign on as cosponsors of H.R. 3308, a proposal to freeze the H-2A Program's Adverse Effect Wage Rate.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes response to cosponsoring the legislation.

Score: 20 points

USDA FUNDING AMENDMENT



An amendment opposed by Farm Bureau would have reduced overall funding for the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Food & Drug Administration. The amendment was defeated by the

U.S. House on Sept. 27, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 20 points

WHOLE MILK FOR HEALTHY KIDS



H.R. 1147, the Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act, would amend the school lunch program to allow flavored and unflavored organic or non-organic whole, reduced-fat, low-fat and fat-free fluid milk and lactose-free fluid milk in schools. Farm Bureau supports the legislation that passed the U.S. House on Dec. 13, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 15 points

LOWER ENERGY COSTS ACT



H.R. 1, the Lower Energy Costs Act, attempts to rectify high energy costs by increasing the production of American energy and reducing regulatory burdens. Farm Bureau supports removing

barriers to energy production because utilization of domestic fuels, including biofuels, have reduced our country's dependence on foreign crude oil, increased farm incomes and provided good-paying jobs in rural America. Farm Bureau supported the legislation that passed the U.S. House on March 30, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 10 points

CONGRESSIONAL REVIEW OF WATERS OF THE U.S.



H.J. Res. 27 would have nullified the rule titled Revised Definition of "Waters of the United States," submitted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Environmental Protection Agency

on January 18, 2023. The rule specifies which bodies of water fall under the scope of the Clean Water Act and are thereby under federal jurisdiction and protected. Farm Bureau supported the joint resolution that passed the U.S. House on March 9, 2023, and the U.S. Senate on March 29, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

ADVERSE EFFECT WAGE RATE FREEZE SENATE COSPONSOR REQUEST



Farm Bureau requested members of Michigan's U.S. Senate delegation to sign on as cosponsors of S. 874, a proposal to freeze the H-2A Program's Adverse Effect Wage Rate.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes response to cosponsoring the legislation.

Score: 10 points

AGRICULTURE CHECKOFF PROGRAMS



An amendment opposed by Farm Bureau sought to defund the operation of any checkoff program established under the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act

of 1996. The amendment was defeated by the U.S. House on Sept. 27, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 10 points

LIVESTOCK IDENTIFICATION



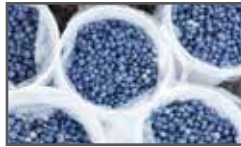
An amendment opposed by Farm Bureau sought to prevent funds from being used to finalize, implement, administer or enforce the proposed rule titled "Use of Electronic Identification Eartags as

Official Identification in Cattle and Bison." The amendment was defeated by the U.S. House on Sept. 27, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a no vote.

Score: 10 points

BLUEBERRY MONTH



S. Res. 309 recognized the importance of the blueberry industry to the United States and designated July 2023 as National Blueberry Month. Farm Bureau supported the resolution that

passed the U.S. Senate on July 25, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 10 points

H-2A WAGE RATE FREEZE LETTER



Rep. Bill Huizenga distributed a letter seeking cosigners to urge Congressional action on a multi-year H-2A Program wage rate freeze.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes response to cosigning the letter.

Score: 10 points

H-2A FEE INCREASES LETTER



Rep. Bill Huizenga distributed a letter seeking cosigners to raise concerns about excessive fee increases for H-2A Program users, including a \$600 asylum fee.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes response to cosigning the letter.

Score: 5 points

NORTHERN LONG-EARED BAT



S.J. Res. 24 would have nullified the rule issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service titled "Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants; Endangered Species Status for Northern Long-

Eared Bat." The rule reclassifies the northern long-eared bat from a threatened species to an endangered species. Farm Bureau supported the joint resolution that passed in the U.S. Senate on May 11, 2023, and in the U.S. House on Sept. 28, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 5 points

LESSER PRAIRIE CHICKEN



S.J. Res. 9 would have nullified the rule issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service titled "Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants; Lesser Prairie-Chicken; Threatened Status with

Section 4(d) Rule for the Northern Distinct Population Segment and Endangered Status for the Southern Distinct Population Segment." The rule adds the Northern Distinct Population Segment of lesser prairie-chicken to the list of threatened species and the Southern District Population Segment of lesser prairie-chicken to the list of endangered species. Farm Bureau supported the joint resolution that passed the U.S. Senate on May 3, 2023.

Position: Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

Score: 5 points

CONGRESS
