# 2026 VOTE RECORD: STATE ISSUES

## EARNED SICK TIME



House Bill 4002 was signed into law on February 21, 2025, amending provisions of the Earned Sick Time Act. Key changes included allowing employers to require new employees to wait 120 days before using earned sick time and to front-load 72 hours of sick time instead of tracking accrual

based on hours worked. The law also reset sick time accrual if a worker left and was rehired by the same employer after two months. In addition, small businesses with 10 or fewer employees had until October 1, 2025, to comply and were required to provide 40 hours of paid sick time, rather than a combination of paid and unpaid time.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## MAEAP FUNDING REAUTHORIZATION



Senate Bill 273, sponsored by Sen. Kevin Daley (R-Lum), reauthorized the funding mechanism for the Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program (MAEAP). The bill renewed existing fertilizer and pesticide fees—without increase—to support the statewide

program, which helped farms voluntarily prevent or minimize environmental risks. The fee structure was extended through 2030. The bill was signed into law on October 8, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## HONEY AND MAPLE SYRUP PRODUCTION



Senate Bill 93, introduced by Sen. Sam Singh (D-East Lansing), allowed honey and maple syrup producers to earn up to cottage food income limits without requiring a licensed kitchen. The bill was signed into law on December 23, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## FARMLAND PRESERVATION PROGRAMS



Senate Bills 685–690 and 699 was a bipartisan package clarifying eligibility for farmland enrolled in both the Farmland and Open Space Preservation Program (P.A. 116) and permanent conservation easements. The legislation restored eligibility for the P.A. 116 income tax credit,

reversing a prior reinterpretation by state agencies. The bills were signed into law on December 31, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 5 points each

## COTTAGE FOOD



House Bill 4122, introduced by Rep. Greg Alexander (R-Carsonville), updated Michigan's cottage food law. Key provisions included allowing third-party sales platforms and mail delivery, increasing the gross sales cap from

\$20,000 to \$50,000 per person, and permitting an optional MSU Product Center registration program. The sales cap could also be adjusted annually based on inflation. The bill was signed into law on December 31, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## MIOSHA REPORTING (HOUSE-ONLY)



House Bill 4017, sponsored by Rep. Jerry Neyer (R-Shepherd), reduces penalties for late reporting of a workplace fatality involving a family member on a farm. While maintaining reporting requirements, the bill reduces penalties by 80% for farms with no prior violations. The bill

passed the House on September 9, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## ANAEROBIC DIGESTERS (HOUSE-ONLY)



House Bill 4257, sponsored by Rep. Jerry Neyer (R-Shepherd), revises permitting requirements for anaerobic digesters to clarify treatment of digestate, allow appropriate inputs, permit land application consistent with GAAMPS, and reduce duplicative

permitting. The bill passed the House on June 12, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## EGLE PERMISSION TO ENTER (HOUSE-ONLY)



House Bill 4421, introduced by Rep. Tom Kunse (R-Clare), would prohibit EGLE employees from entering private property without landowner consent. The bill passed the House on November 4, 2025, and awaits Senate consideration.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 5 points

## RENEWABLE ENERGY SITING AUTHORITY (HOUSE-ONLY)



House Bill 4027, sponsored by Rep. Greg Alexander (R-Carsonville), would repeal the 2023 law granting siting authority for large renewable energy projects to the Public Service Commission and return zoning authority to local governments. The bill passed the

House on April 30, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 5 points

# 2026 VOTE RECORD: STATE ISSUES

## LANDOWNER LIABILITY (HOUSE-ONLY)



House Bill 4582, sponsored by Rep. Jerry Neyer (R-Shepherd), would reinstate the “open and obvious” doctrine, restoring liability protections for property owners. The doctrine was overturned by the Michigan Supreme Court in 2023. The bill passed the House on March 11, 2026.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 10 points

## DEER FEEDING AND BAITING (HOUSE-ONLY)



House Bill 4445, sponsored by Rep. Jennifer Wortz (R-Quincy), would allow deer baiting during the open hunting season. The bill passed the House on February 4, 2026.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 5 points

## HUNTING AND FISHING FEES (SENATE-ONLY)



Senate Bill 276, sponsored by Sen. John Cherry (D-Flint), proposes updates to hunting and fishing license fees. Changes include increasing the base hunting license fee and surcharge, adjusting deer license fees by decreasing doe tags and DMAP costs, authorizing “earn-a-second-buck” rules, and updating other species and fishing fees. The bill passed the Senate on October 21, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 5 points

## SUSTAINABLE AVIATION FUEL (SENATE-ONLY)



Senate Bills 235 and 236, sponsored by Sen. Sam Singh (D-East Lansing) and Sen. Joe Bellino (R-Monroe), would create tax incentives to support production of sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) in Michigan. SAF offers a potential new market for agricultural feedstocks, including corn. The

bills passed the Senate in June 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 5 points each

# 2026 VOTE RECORD: FEDERAL ISSUES

## ONE BIG BEAUTIFUL BILL



The One Big Beautiful Bill was signed into law on July 4, 2025. The package extended and updated provisions of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act and included approximately 60% of the Farm Bill titles needed by agriculture, providing key support for farm programs and rural priorities.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 25 points

## FARM, FOOD, AND NATIONAL SECURITY ACT (HOUSE-ONLY)



The Farm, Food, and National Security Act would make sweeping updates to agriculture and nutrition policies that haven't been updated since the 2018 Farm Bill. The bill would fill gaps in risk management tools, voluntary conservation programs, research and innovation, and the specialty crop industry. The bill passed the House on April 30, 2026.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 25 points

## NATIONWIDE CONSUMER AND FUEL RETAILER CHOICE ACT (HOUSE-ONLY)



The Nationwide Consumer and Fuel Retailer Choice Act would allow the year-round sale of gasoline blended with 15% ethanol and as a result, increase the demand for U.S. corn. The bill passed the House on May 13, 2026.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 20 points

## WHOLE MILK FOR HEALTHY KIDS ACT (SENATE-ONLY)



The Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act was signed into law on January 14, 2026, allowing schools to offer whole, reduced-fat, low-fat, and fat-free milk, both flavored and unflavored; permits parents or legal guardians to provide written documentation for milk substitutions; and excludes fluid milk from saturated fat calculations used to determine nutrition standard compliance.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 20 points

## FAIRNESS FOR FRUITS AND VEGETABLES ACT COSPONSORSHIP (SENATE-ONLY)



The Fairness for Fruits and Vegetables Act of 2025 would establish an interagency working group involving to monitor trade data for seasonal and perishable fruits and vegetables. The bill would also create a formal process for producers and trade associations to provide input on unfair trade practices, helping ensure a

more level playing field for American growers.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged cosponsorship.

**Score:** 5 points

## PET AND LIVESTOCK PROTECTION ACT (HOUSE-ONLY)



The Pet and Livestock Protection Act of 2025 would direct the Department of the Interior to remove Endangered Species Act protections for the gray wolf by reinstating a 2020 rule that delisted the species across most of the lower 48 states. The bill would also prohibit judicial review of the reissued rule. The bill passed the

House on December 18, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote.

**Score:** 20 points

## PERMIT ACT



The PERMIT Act would limit the scope of the Clean Water Act by narrowing the definition of navigable waters. The bill would exclude waste treatment systems, ephemeral features that flow only in response to precipitation, prior converted cropland, groundwater, and other features as determined by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The bill passed the House on December 11, 2025.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged a yes vote

**Score:** 15 points

## SPECIALTY CROP CAUCUS LETTER (HOUSE-ONLY)



This bipartisan letter urged congressional agriculture committees to ensure the \$1 billion designated for specialty crop assistance was distributed quickly, fairly, and equitably to producers.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged signing on.

**Score:** 5 points

## H-2A WAGE FREEZE LETTER (HOUSE-ONLY)



This bipartisan letter urged House Appropriations leaders to include a temporary freeze on the Adverse Effect Wage Rate in federal spending legislation. The request aimed to provide relief to farmers facing rapidly increasing labor costs under the H-2A program.

**Position:** Farm Bureau encouraged signing on.

**Score:** 5 points
